We have a beautiful space to worship, yes, but if our sanctuary is just a nice spot for us to do our “religious thing,” then I’m afraid we’ve missed something crucial. We may have created something beautiful, but it may be of very limited value.

We are reminded everyday that the world “out there” is a dangerous, scary place. The world “out there” needs the divine things around which

we gather, and by which we are fed. What really matters — more than the space in which we worship — is the *community*, gathered around the gifts of God. To the extent that our sanctuary enables that gathering, and to the degree that it transmits a sense of welcome and peace and grace, then we have done something truly worthwhile.

As I write this, the tragedy of Houston continues to unfold, a reminder that our sanctuaries are illusions. The “real world” gives us no pause to comfortably settle. There is much work to do, the work of justice, peace and love. This is a “through place,” a place where we are refreshed for work that God has called us to do.

And not just for us; this is, indeed, a place of grace for all.

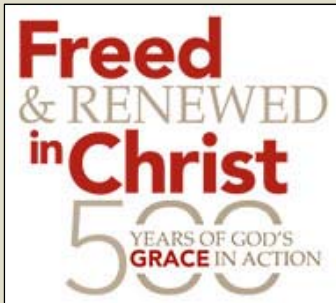

## Mountain TOP — July 15 to 23

Traveling to Tennessee mountains this past July for the 2017 youth summer mission were Austin Cummis, Shane Cummis, Brody Hageneder, Brendon Hoagland, Walter Jacobus, James Kildea, Chris Lange, Nick Mauro, and chaperones, Pastor Kildea and Bob Fiscella. A few reflections of their week of service are printed below. Hear more of their experiences at worship on September 10.



My experience at Mountain TOP was very powerful. On the first day, we were assigned to a small group that would work together for the week to accomplish the tasks given to us. One of the things that stood out to me is one of the people I met in my small group named Loftin. He is from Texas and is the volunteer youth director at his church. He is going to college for a degree in Theology, as he wants to become a pastor himself, but interestingly enough, he's not overly concerned about getting the degree, because he believes being a pastor is so much more than having a piece of paper. As the Youth Director, Loftin was able to recruit around 80 young people to his church by going places where young people hang out and talking to them about how church is important and can also be really fun. We are still in contact and he constantly posts inspiring messages to his friends on Snapchat. Meeting him was one of the most intriguing experiences I had and something I did not expect when going to Mountain TOP. It was inspiring to see someone relatively young that seemed so close to God.

I loved swimming in the pool, going on early morning hikes with Jacob, and canoeing on our beloved Lake Beisler.

The rise and shine morning sing fest with Rachel Kurtz was fun and silly and inspiring for kids of all ages. We had the opportunity to do so many camp activities like swimming, canoeing, arts & crafts, fort building, archery, giant swing, and more. We ended each day with worship and fellowship. We even had an eclipse viewing party with the staff and campers sharing viewing boxes & glasses.

In the morning, Discovery was insightful, with a hands-on demonstration — Walk for Water. We walked to the lake with buckets and varied plastic containers. Along the way we read informational facts about what many women and girls must do to meet their family's basic needs. They sacrifice their education when the girls of the family need to get water. They might walk nearly 4 miles round trip to get water that may not be safe to drink, risking disease and death just to have any kind of water for their families. Our walk was 3/7 of a mile one way. It was hard on our hands and arms and our backs. It was a startling realization that this is something these families do every day and what a blessing clean, safe and ready to use water is to us.

The whole week was a great blessing to me with great encouragement given to me by Rachel. I can't thank her enough; it will always be treasured by me. I encourage everyone to consider a week at Family Camp. What a Blessing.

I am excited to welcome everyone back to Redeemer's Sunday School program! We will begin the year enjoying Rally Day with our congregation by attending worship service on Sunday, September 10. After the 10:15 worship service, all students and parents will be invited to meet the students' Sunday School teachers. During this time, parents may complete the Sunday School registration paperwork. If you prefer, you may fill out the registration forms prior to Rally Day and bring them with you. These forms can be found on the church web-site: redeemeronline.net under the Learn/Sunday School tab. Once you have registered your child, please join us for the all church family picnic. Instructional classes will resume on Sunday, September 17.

As we have done in the past, fifth grade through high school will begin at **10:15 AM** in their classrooms. The students' lesson period will be formatted around the 10:15 AM worship bulletin. Bible readings and the "sermon" will be based on their class lesson for the day. These groups will also be joining the worship service to partake in Holy Communion and then will return to their classroom for the ending prayers and the closing of their lesson. This structure allows us the opportunity to incorporate worship into our instructional program since our class time is concurrent with the 10:15 worship service. All other grades (pre-k through 4<sup>th</sup> grade) will begin their Sunday School class time in the 10:15 worship service. After the children's message, they will be invited to begin their class time in their classrooms.

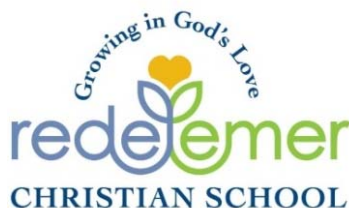


### Lunch and Laser Tag

The remainder of our staff consists of Michelle Amaducci, Kathy Bolognese, Kristen Brinkmann, Kathleen Callaghan, Karen Dell'Aglio, Heather Fico, Charleen Gurnari, Connie Jaeger, Carolyn O'Leary, Heather O'Mara, Anne Sauchelli, Lori Walter, Alison Remick, and Stephanie Yin. Each staff member is required to maintain their professional skills and certification each year in accordance with the State of New Jersey in Continuing Education and each staff member is required to be certified in CPR and First Aid as well. Pastor Tom and Pastor Jaye lead us in worship on Thursdays and Fridays for which we are very grateful and our RCS Board which consists of Keith Guarneri, Pastor Tom Kildea, Susan Schnabel, Cindy Feeney, Amanda Raymond, Kathy Ribe, Audrey Svenningsen, Carolyn Truax, and Judi Frank donate their time to help our school run as efficiently as it does.

We are continuing with our "Beginning Bears" program for 2 years olds (a six week session once a week for ninety minutes), while we again offer classes for 2 1/2's, 3's, 4's and the STARS (Social Techniques and Academic Readiness Skills) class. The 4's have a full day class which always fills very fast! We offer lunch bunch/ brunch sessions to extend the days. "Early Birds," computer training from age 3 and above, Morris Museum sessions with our 4's and above, as well as field trips, holiday celebrations and many specials to enrich our children. We are proud to now have a Hatch Interactive Display geared towards preschoolers.

We thank you Redeemer congregation for your constant support, prayers, and kind words about our school that you relay to others. We know firsthand how wonderful it is to introduce young children to our Lord and we are fortunate to be the first educational experience for over 100 students.
